Dear Friends

Carys Walls, an Anglican priest, writes 'Lent is a time of drawing closer to Christ as we travel with Him through the forty wilderness days towards the Passion, and Holy Week, and ultimately Easter. We may enter this time in a spirit of preparation and penitence, hopeful of encountering Christ more deeply and fully; and along the way, we may be transformed as we discover what it means to bring the whole of ourselves, what we're proud of, what we're ashamed of, before God in all our dappled existence.' Read Gerald Manley Hopkins poem about the dappled nature of God's world and humanity within it at the end of this magazine.

Hopkins was born in London in 1844 and entered the Jesuit order of priests as a young man. His poems are complex but his words, for some, sing wonderfully about God's presence. Hopkins encountered times of personal darkness and turmoil. He experienced times of profound desolation. When he died, a young man, in 1889, he left a body of poetry with an imprint of struggle and rawness as indelible as his faith and love for the God he dedicated his life to praising. This variegated faith, acknowledging light and shade, can lift us up, but also is realistic that we don't always live on the sunny uplands of life.



We might all think of times when we have stood on a hillside watching the clouded sun cast light and shadow on the countryside before. Or maybe you have watched a similar effect on the waters of the sea or a river shimmering and sparkling one moment, dull and grey the next. Or maybe you've walked under the canopy of trees on a day which can be bright with sunlight, but the sun goes in and you walk suddenly through darkness.

There is an honesty in Christian faith, and we see it caught in the Jewish hymnbook we call the Psalms, that is truthful about highs and lows, ups and downs, brightness and darkness. Faith mitigates our optimism and our pessimism. Whether the music in our lives, or in the Church, is cheery or solemn, we need to recognise that both will add to the texture of our lived faith, an honest companion beside us through a

Lenten life that leads us, sooner or later, to Easter Day.

Honest faith helps us cope with what is good and what is less than good in life, our dappled existence. In the times of shadow, know that the light will come.


## BELIEVING, BELONGING AND BECOMING

## LENT STUDIES – LIVING GENEROUSLY

This year's Lent Studies are drawn from the recent Church of Scotland Stewardship Department book, **Living Generously - a whole-life response to God's love.** (Saint Andrew Press 2024)

Generosity for Christians really is about the way we choose to live - so much more than, but not less than, how much we decide to drop into the offering on Sundays (or the amount we give via direct debit or standing order). The attitude of gratitude moves us a million miles away from an approach that is fashioned around, 'crumbs from the rich man's table'. It's a lifestyle that begins not from, 'what I have got left', but from, 'what have I got to start with...'

Whilst there are still some who argue as soon as finance and stewardship is raised that, 'the church is always after your money', we are nevertheless called by God to live generously, and certainly not considering, 'what's in it for me?'

A considerable proportion of what Jesus teaches in the gospels - including nearly half the parables - relates to money and wealth and our attitude to them.

Even in financially challenging times for individuals, and charities, and governments, and churches, Christians still see people reflecting God's generosity in the way life is lived, through the gifting of time, talents and money. For Christians, we do this in the context of our relationship with God, through Jesus, and inspired by the Holy Spirit. Our Lent studies will give us the opportunity to reflect on this spiritual and practical understanding of what faith can be.

There will be a morning option and an evening option for these studies:

Wednesdays 4<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> March - 11am in the Cluny Hall (*have a coffee at the Wednesday coffee morning in the Braid Hall first!*)

Wednesdays 4<sup>th</sup>, Thursday 12<sup>th</sup> March, 7.30pm at the Manse (20 Braidburn Crescent, EH10 6EN) *refreshments served.*

1. A closer walk with God
2. Volunteers - Christianity with its sleeves rolled up
3. Money - Your money where your heart is
4. An attitude of gratitude - God's generosity is transformational, not transactional

## KIRK SESSION NEWS

The Kirk Session met in February .and discussed the following:

**Presbytery Reform** - The Moderator reported that a letter had been received from the Presbytery's Deployment Committee after meetings with representatives from Morningside, Greenbank and Fairmilehead. The Committee has agreed that it will pause the current round of discussions between the congregations until it becomes clear from the 2026 General Assembly in May what is going to be proposed in relation to Presbytery Mission Planning. A potential change in approach to vacant congregations has been alluded to but there is, as of yet, no clear direction coming from the Assembly Trustees and others who are considering legislation. Our Kirk Session remains frustrated by the slowness of progress.

**Morningside Umbrella Festival** - Robert Armour reported on further developments in the fundraising campaign. Monies raised already are anticipated to be over £10,000 by the end of February. Legacy money is also being earmarked for the roof repairs. Momentum is building but there is still a long way to go. There is clearly strong support from the parish and community, schools, the Morningside Club, colleges and care homes as well as local business. This needs to be matched by commitment from the congregation. Volunteers will be required for a number of events and projects announced in intimations, magazine and weekly email. Consider joining Easyfundraising (endorsed by the Church of Scotland). Earmark Umbrella Festival event dates as they come up, and support and attend them. Above all, **be positive** and encourage and support those working hard to take the campaign forward. The roof repair is a huge challenge and, 'business as usual' will not meet the likely cost of c£300,000. We can't do it on our own, which is why we are working hard to involve the community, but as members of the congregation, we need to step up too.

#### **Reports from Committees -**

**Education Committee - Kenny Robertson, Convener**, reported on its responsibilities for Sunday Club and adult education. Sunday Club attendance seems cyclical, but those attending enjoy the activities, and particularly their higher visibility at the 10.30am service. The Christmas Nativity was a highlight for the young people, who all enjoyed taking part. Over the Christmas period a film night was trialled in the Cluny Hall. The young people were encouraged to bring a friend to the event, and all did, enjoying the film, pizza and sweets. The event was a success. Crêche remains available for very young children each Sunday. The committee wanted to make clear its gratitude to Rona McLaren who invests huge amounts of time and energy to make Sunday Club educational, fun and engaging, alongside Laura Shaw who has stepped in to help. Adult Education has involved the ongoing Autumn Lecture series, last year focussing on ecological issues, and will be preparing for the Lent Study series focussing on the Church of Scotland Stewardship publication, *Living Generously, a whole-life response to God's love*. The Minister will also be offering an enquiry class, *Believing and Belonging*, in March, for those thinking about becoming members of the Church.

**Worship Committee - Douglas Paterson, Convener**, reported on discussion about events in the recent Christmas season. The full Church at a number of events was encouraging. There was particular praise for the outstanding talent and commitment demonstrated by choir, organist and readers at the Lessons and Carols Service, and the choral scholars also provided a much-enjoyed musical contribution at the Christmas Tree Festival. The Blue Christmas service, for those who find Christmas difficult through bereavement or other life-challenges, continues to be highly valued by those attending. The committee was looking forward to the All-Age Communion in March. Holy Week services will be held in Greenbank on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, and on the latter there will be a joint choir. The Holy Saturday service of readings and music will be held in our Church.

Interest was expressed in looking to widen awareness of other faith traditions in the city. The Minister hopes to organise visits to different faith communities, particularly the Jewish and Islamic communities, in the coming months.

**Property Committee - Moira Clark, Convener**, reported concerns relating to lighting and heating. A faulty light sensor affecting outside lights in late December has now been remedied. A standard light outside the office, which provides light to access to the Cluny Hall, will either be repaired or replaced.

Radiators have been tampered, by unknown and unauthorised persons, in the lavatories by the St Matthew Hall, and in the choir area in Church. This tampering caused malfunctions in the Plant Room

and in the Church (where an unauthorised person had turned off half of the radiators manually). A heating engineer was called out at not inconsiderable expense to repair the damage done. The convener emphasised strongly that **no unauthorised person must tamper with the heating and lighting in the Church premises**. Any concerns should be relayed to her or to the Church caretakers.

**Safeguarding** - the Moderator reported that Paul Cackette, who has been our Safeguarding Officer for two decades, has intimated he wishes to stand down. Neil Thrower, one of our new elders, has agreed to take up the role and a handover process will begin soon.

**Presbytery Elder's Report - Robin Stimpson, Presbytery Elder**, reported that Presbytery met on 3<sup>rd</sup> February. The Revd Dr Sandy Forsyth completed his year as Moderator of Presbytery, and Mr Darren Philip, a Presbytery elder from West Lothian, and one of the national Church Stewardship advisers, was installed as the new Moderator.

**The Business Committee** recently considered 'that with progress being made on implementing the Presbytery Mission Plan there is now opportunity to consider the wider purposes of Presbytery.' A number of themes and ideas were discussed with the aim that Presbyters would share good practice and good news stories from their congregations. The first theme was 'Good News for Easter', and our Minister, who is also the Convener of the Presbytery Business Committee, shared the success of our Easter Tree at Morningside - a simple, attractive, eye-catching and much photographed feature which demonstrated that Easter can be celebrated outside as well as inside Church buildings.

**Training for Ministers** was discussed at last year's General Assembly where a decision was taken to move to one academic provider who would take a leading role. It will be recommended at the 2026 General Assembly that Trinity College, part of Glasgow University, might become the lead provider if approved in May 2026.

**Insolvent Charges:** It was reported that in the event of a congregation being designated as insolvent, Presbytery will dissolve the congregation and terminate a Minister's tenure. However, before this point is reached there will have been at least three months of conversations involving office bearers from local, regional and national Church bodies aimed at reaching a position of financial sustainability. A sign of the times.

**Under Any Other Competent Business**, the Kirk Session received a proposal to create a children's and young people's choir, **Morningside Melodies**. This was partly inspired by the BBC Get Singing programme. Discussions have still to be held, but it is hoped that an informal, fun choir for children from the ages of Primary 6 to Secondary Year 3 from local schools might sing a mixture of contemporary pieces plus an introduction to sacred choral music. The proposal was made by one of our current choral scholars. Watch this space!





He fathers-forth whose beauty is past change:

Praise him.
